### Broughton Mills, Woodland & Foxfield

The 6th May meeting was attended by twenty ladies and we started by discussing various recent and upcoming local events, including a bluebell walk from Bardsea on the 11th May and a trip to Levens Hall on the 6th August.

We were pleased to welcome Nigel Rowe, speaking about 'Cycling around Patagonia'. Nigel has spent the last eight years biking around the world.

The illustrated talk covered his 4500km cycle ride across Argentina, over the Andes and through Chilean Patagonia to Ushai. Much of his journey was unaccompanied and he fought through many different terrains and temperatures, including many miles of pampas where he saw no other people, only vehicles. At night he would pitch his tent, at the side of the road, under bridges or storm drains...really anywhere that was convenient. He travelled light but essential items included pans, cooking gas/stove, spares for the bike and underpants! Plus minimal but multifunctional clothing.

He would always travel in a west to east direction due to the prevailing winds. Patagonia is famous for powerful winds, which can be ferocious, battering and utterly brutal. At times so severe were they that he was actually forced backwards, including one day when he had to push his bike for 42 miles, including downhill as otherwise he was blown backwards.

Argentina is apparently famous for cows, wine, dancing, sugar, cotton and wind turbines. Roadside shrines were plentiful and religion is an important part of the culture.

The foothills of the Andes were particularly fabulous with stunning scenery. One town, Babouchi is aka 'Little Switzerland', due to the predominant Swiss architecture and wealth.

Two days further over the Andes to Chile, which is the 38<sup>th</sup> largest country in the world and twice the size of Japan. Here there was an abundance of rural countryside and farming.

South to Patagonia, and on to Mount Fitzroy, a spectacular mountain, on the border between Argentina and Chile, in the Southern Patagonian Ice Field. It is a popular tourist destination for hikers, named after Robert FitzRoy who as captain of *HMS Beagle* (of Darwin fame) travelled up the Santa Cruz River and chartered large parts of the Patagonian coast.

Nigel's slideshow gave us a very clear picture of the route and its variation of culture, weather and terrain/road conditions. Also the challenges; at one point Nigel had to carry his bike through what looked like a mud plain, and then damaged it as it was 'helped' over a fence. Whilst at first this damage looked pretty grim, Nigel was eventually able to self repair it and continue.

The expedition sounded fantastic, but somewhat terrifying to the less adventurous of us in the audience! Nigel is clearly an expert traveller and cyclist, with superb planning and preparation skills.

His future plans include Bangkok to Singapore; China; and Argentina to Peru. Before these however a trip to Norway, Sweden and Finland is imminent. Wow.

Nigel was warmly thanked by Jan for sharing his fabulous journey and enthusiasm for travelling with us.

Our next meeting on June 3rd at 7.30pm, is at Broughton Mills Reading Room. We will be joined by Elenor on the subject of 'Wicker'.

Please feel free to join us, a warm welcome awaits.

### Ulpha & Seathwaite

Happy 95th Birthday Ulpha and Seathwaite WI

It was with our usual mixed weather that we met to celebrate our birthday and what an evening it was! We were joined by our friends from Coniston, Silecroft, Thwaites and Broughton Mills. We had four past members travel to join us and what a delight it was to see them. We also had two Federation representatives and we are very appreciative of their efforts to journey to our meeting. It is a wonderful opportunity to see our friends but it is always a responsibility to ensure their journey is worth it! I think we can say that the journey was indeed worthwhile.

Our speaker, Rob David presented a talk entitled National Treasures - saving the nations art works. I am sure that some of you will have heard this fascinating talk as Rob has presented it around the county, telling the little known story of the transfer of the most precious of the Tate Galleries art works to safety in remote Cumbria from the London bombings.

They were transported to Muncaster Castle by train and wagon by staff that had no idea of what they had been entrusted with. The local fire stations had been alerted to the need to arrive quickly at Muncaster in the event of fire as there was 'a valuable collection' housed there, but no information was given about where it was from. Unfortunately the alert was written on Tate headed paper!

The paintings were accompanied by their own staff who were also detailed to remain at Muncaster for the duration of the war, which in itself must have been a rather different experience from London. Restoration continued and the paintings were cared for, with the boxes opened and checked continuously. There are virtually no photographs of this time of the paintings at Muncaster.

The press seemed to get wind of the role of Muncaster as a depository for the most precious art works from The Tate at the end of the war in October 1945 and thus it was no longer a well hidden secret.

This fascinating talk was followed by a delicious and plentiful supper, concluding with fizz and cake, and a speech from our President. The evening was accompanied by much chatter, laughter, eating and friendship. The biggest challenge was bringing the festivities to an end - surely a tribute to the hard work our committee had put in to ensure its success.

We all hoped that it was a fitting tribute to those ladies who founded our branch of the Ulpha and Seathwaite WI 95 years ago.

Five years and we can celebrate our centenary!

### DUDDON VALLEY LOCAL HISTORY GROUP

The next two History talks in May and June deal with hugely contrasting subjects. On 27th May we will hear about the journals and life of Kenneth Burgess who came here at the beginning of WW2, fleeing the bombing around his home in south London. He was a complex man with an adventurous early life. He found much needed peace in Seathwaite and wrote about what he found and particularly about nature, having a regular column in the Westmorland Gazette.

This is followed in June by a visit by Cyril Pearce, the country's leading authority on "Communities of Resistance during the Great War". Cyril's research examines local communities to reveal a bigger and more complex picture of a nation at war, and the actions of those who resisted the demands of the state because of their beliefs. Broughton and its surrounds have a part to play in connecting the local and national story.

As it happens, the two talks are linked by a connection with Wreaks End. Kenneth Burgess lived for a number of years at Wreaks End Cottage having moved from Seathwaite. Much earlier in 1902, Wreaks Farm was bought by William Stoker, a businessman from Wigan. Stoker and his sons would play a significant role in resisting the onset of Conscription in 1916..... and thereafter became involved in the General Strike and the establishment of the Communist Party of Great Britain.

## MESSAGE FROM OUR MP MICHELLE SCROGHAM

LOTS of work is happening in the background to restore Level 3 critical care services at Furness General Hospital.

Just over six months ago I hosted a packed public meeting at Hawcoat Park Sports Club in Barrow for members of the public to openly discuss the deeply unpopular proposals by the Integrated Care Board to permanently stop providing the critical care services we all depend on. We said we would fight the board's plans to send critically-ill patients by ambulance along the notorious A590 to receive treatment at Lancaster Royal Infirmary.

Everyone who attended that meeting at Hawcoat Park – and all those who joined our campaign against the proposed changes – have played their part in making sure that the ICB has been forced to look again at this hugely important matter. Readers may remember that last year I also formally asked government ministers to use their powers under Schedule 10A of the National Health Service to call in the proposal. If it comes to it, I am prepared to push for ministers to step in.

However, I am hopeful that it will not come to that. From the start I have always said that with a proper plan and coordination we can fix the challenges that the ICB has identified in their reasons for closing level 3 critical care.

I have therefore been working with partners including University Hospitals of Morecambe Bay NHS Foundation Trust, Team Barrow, BAE Systems, national government departments, NHS England and the University of Cumbria work together to create a positive vision for the future. That must happen so we can attract the clinicians we need for critical care and other important service at FGH.

To move this forward, I recently set up a working group to explore possible solutions. The group has identified options including developing the research and robotics offer at FGH that will make sure we have what is needed to keep attracting the best clinicians in the country.

Work is also being taken forward looking at approaches that have worked elsewhere in the country; for example, the partnership between Portsmouth Hospital and the Ministry of Defence to train military doctors. There has been a good response from all the organisations involved in this work and I believe there's a real opportunity here to find solutions that will not only restore level 3 critical care, but to ensure it thrives for many years to come.

I have therefore written to the ICB calling on them to immediately pause their process for permanently closing level 3 critical care. This pause is essential to provide the time and stability needed for the collaborative work to progress. There is real momentum, and it is crucial that it is not undermined by the ongoing threat of closure.

## Subscription-based garden waste collection service

Residents who wish to continue receiving garden waste collections will need to subscribe to the service.

Garden waste bins will be collected as usual until 28 June 2026, after that time only bins displaying a valid sticker will be collected.

General household waste and recycling collections remain unaffected.

You can subscribe at any time during the collection season for the full £60 subscription fee. There are no discounts for joining midway through the subscription period - the sooner you sign up for the service, the more collections you'll have.

This change follows decisions made as part of the Council's 2026/27 budget, agreed at Full Council on 26 February, and reflects the need to review discretionary services in light of significant financial challenges. Garden waste collection is not a statutory service, and introducing a charge ensures fairness with those who use the service contributing to its cost while helping the council protect essential services for all residents.

### Cost

There's an annual subscription of £60 per bin. You'll need to pay the subscription fee in full when you sign up. We do not

accept payment in instalments. We do not offer discounts for households who receive benefits or council tax reductions.

There are no limits on the number of bins you can have. For each extra bin there is a one-off payment of £25 plus an annual subscription fee of £60.

### How it works

Garden waste will be collected every two weeks except for the non-growing seasons in December, January and February when there will not be any collections.

This works out as a maximum of 20 garden waste collections, over the 40-week subscription period.

Once you've paid, we'll send a sticker, by post, for each bin you've subscribed for. You must place the sticker under the handle on your bin.

You must use a bin that we've provided. You cannot use your own bin or any other type of container.

Your subscription will not automatically renew in March. We'll contact you before your subscription ends and tell you what to do if you want to sign up again. If you do not renew, we'll stop collecting your garden waste without further notice.

## BROUGHTON POST OFFICE



On 9<sup>th</sup> June Broughton's new Post Office will have been open six months! We want to take this opportunity to again thank everyone who helped make it possible to get the branch up and running. It couldn't have happened without all the donations, goodwill and support from our wonderful community.

We are so pleased that, thanks to Siobhan and Ingrid's dedication, postal and banking services are available again in Broughton. Don't forget, you can also buy Euros over the counter, order foreign currencies and get a PO Travel Card for your holidays.

**A reminder that the deadline to drop off letters and parcels for same day collection by Royal Mail is 4.20 pm on Monday/ Tuesday/Thursday and 11 am on Friday.**

We are optimistic that progress is now being made on getting a post box installed outside the post office. Following a meeting between Broughton CIC, Royal Mail and Highways, it was agreed that an advisory loading bay should help meet Royal Mail's safety concerns. In mid-May, Highways sent out a letter to residents and businesses on The Square inviting comments on the proposal. If the proposal is

approved and a further safety assessment comes out positive, then a post box should make an appearance in several months' time.

Our new community shop and information service with our lovely team of volunteers is of course key to being able to provide a post office. We've been working hard to stock the shop with a range of products and are very appreciative of all the positive feedback received. One of our aims is to support Cumbrian artisans and enterprises so we do hope that you will come and have a browse.

As well as being filmed for French TV for an item about community interest companies, our premises have recently received a Gold Award from Age Friendly South Lakeland. Our staff and volunteers have also been provided with training on safeguarding and dementia awareness.

Operation Lantern is a police initiative trying to deter vehicles such as motorbikes and 4x4s off-roading on the Fells. This hugely destructive practice is, in most cases illegal and witnesses are being asked to report these offences to the police, using 101, giving as many details as possible; make and model of vehicle, registration number, specific times and locations. When reporting ask, for a log number to ensure the crime is recorded. The more reporting that takes place the greater the resources allocated to combat this rural crime.

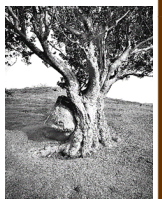

Duddon Valley Medical Practice (DVMP) is NOT closing.

The Kirkby surgery building will cease to be used as a surgery building from 31 July 2026 and the building is to be sold by the current owner. DVMP will continue to be fully operational nevertheless and will only deliver medical services from Broughton and Askam surgery buildings after this date. We apologise for the short notice.

Access to Broughton and Askam surgery buildings will be significantly increased after 31 July 2026 to accommodate the needs of our patients when the Kirkby surgery building finally closes.

We hope you understand that the decision NOT to buy Kirkby surgery as a going concern will improve economic resilience and increase stability for patients and staff alike during what is a very difficult economic climate nationally. Rural practices have been closing across the country at a rate of one per week but, DVMP has no intention of closing.

In the meantime, we would appreciate your cooperation by not distracting our staff from carrying out their duties by asking for further information about the closure from them. We WILL provide further information to you as soon as possible to help prevent any unnecessary anxieties during this transition from three surgery buildings, to two.

## Sheep Detectives and Our View of God

Recently our family went to see *The Sheep Detectives*, a charming film about a flock of sheep trying to solve the mystery of their shepherd George's death. Beneath the humour, however, the story raises some surprisingly thoughtful questions about God, the church, life and death.

One scene especially stayed with me. As the sheep walk past a church, they try to work out who God is. Because they only partly understand what humans have told them, their conclusions become wonderfully confused. They decide that God is invisible, that He is a shepherd, that He is also a lamb, and somehow "made of bread." After watching Communion, they even pity "poor God" for being eaten every Sunday.

It is funny because, from a sheep's point of view, these ideas sound ridiculous. Yet perhaps the scene resonates because many people today also build their understanding of God from fragments — childhood memories, hearsay, disappointments, or stereotypes. The result can become a confused picture of faith that bears little resemblance to Christianity itself.

In the film, the sheep also believe that God literally lives inside the church building. Again, this sounds amusing, but many people quietly think of church in a similar way — as simply an old building used for weddings, funerals, and Christmas services rather than a living community of faith.

Perhaps the most interesting part of the film is the sheep's view of death. They believe sheep become clouds when they die and survive by forgetting painful realities. They avoid grief and cling to what feels safe and familiar.

That raises an important point for all of us. Human beings often prefer comfort to truth. We distract ourselves from difficult questions about suffering, mortality, and meaning. Christianity, however, does not ask people to ignore pain or pretend death is unreal. Instead, it faces sorrow honestly while offering hope beyond it.

One touching moment comes when Mopple, the wisest sheep, insists that George should not simply be forgotten. "A friend should never be forgotten," he says. That reflects something deeply Christian: that every human life matters because each person is known and loved by God.

The humour in *The Sheep Detectives* comes from the sheep misunderstanding everything. Yet perhaps the film quietly asks whether we sometimes misunderstand God. Instead of relying on assumptions or caricatures, maybe we should look more closely at what Christianity is really saying — because what first appears strange may contain far more truth and hope than we expect.

At the end of May (31st) we have an opportunity to celebrate all the lambs being born in our Benefice Lambing Service. At the end of June (30th), we are running our next Bereavement Journey for those who need space to process the impact of a death, whether recent or long ago.

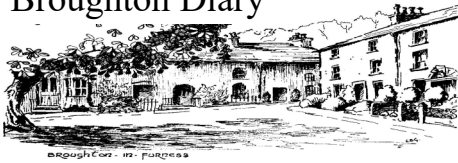

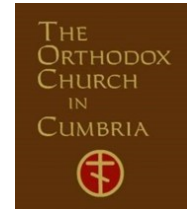
